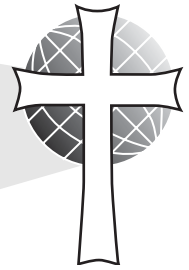

Thinking outside of the box on Sunday evening: **New service brings individuals and worship together in harmony**

Many people yearn for hospitality, fellowship, unconditional acceptance and simplicity. And, a growing number of individuals are finding just that at Bethel's new Sunday evening worship service.

Bethel kicked off this casual, welcoming service earlier this year. About 80 people attend each Sunday – a mix of young and old, Bethel members and guests that represent different cultures and socio-economic backgrounds.

“Our goal is for the Sunday evening service to attract a diverse group of unchurched, dechurched and even anti-church people,” Pastor Rick Lund said. “By approaching worship in a different way, we hope to reach individuals who are not necessarily drawn to a traditional, liturgical Lutheran service.”

Music is the cornerstone of this unique approach. Participants worship in the sanctuary and enjoy music from a variety of talented, local musicians and choirs.

“Music is certainly key, but creating space for the Holy Spirit to work

faith among the congregation is the ultimate goal of this effort,” Pastor Lund said. “I’m sensing an excitement and spiritual energy that confirms our worship is everything we hoped it would be – and more.”

The Bethel Endowment Foundation supports efforts like the new format of the Sunday evening worship service, which help spread the good news of Jesus Christ.

Bethel choirs welcome new “musical chairs”

There’s plenty of upbeat music coming from Bethel’s choir loft and choir room – not only because our singers and instrumentalists are expressing their faith through music – but they also have new chairs.

“After decades of use, our old chairs needed to be replaced,” said Gary Lewis, director of music. “The new chairs are more supportive, promote good posture and are equipped with racks to hold hymnals and music.”

The necessary upgrade of the chairs was made possible with a grant from the Bethel Endowment Foundation.

“Again, Bethel’s music ministry benefits from the wise investment of gifts from the Bethel Endowment Foundation,” Lewis said.

A gift from Bethel member Leona Sonderegger and a bequest from the Sid and Eleanor Foye estate combined to match the grant and cover the cost of the chairs.



Spreading our faith to China

Inspiring words to Pastor Lin Qui from Reverend Yoncheng Li in Hawaii



Imagine having the desire to share the Christian message and teach congregational lay leaders – but not having the tools to take on this mission.

This is a real scenario in Mainland Chinese churches and Chinese speaking congregations in North America. Fortunately, ELCA Pastor Lin Qui has a solution. He translated the Bethel Series into Chinese and will use this tool to help train Chinese Christians.

The Bethel Series is a Bible study program that was started at Bethel more than 50 years ago. Nearly 7,000 churches in 14 countries have used the Bethel Series to gain a solid base in the Bible and help train pastors.

“The Bethel Series is the answer to a prayer for Pastor Lin and many Chinese

congregations here and in Asia,” said Mary Brennan, Adult Christian Education Foundation board member. “It fills a real need by providing the means for him to share God’s love with the Chinese people.”

Pastor Lin will teach the Bethel Series at several churches and seminaries in China this year. He also plans to share the message with Chinese congregations on the east and west coasts. Funding from the Bethel Endowment Foundation helps support this global mission.

“Using the Bethel Series to teach the Christian message in China is a solid example of Bethel’s commitment to being a city-wide church with a worldwide ministry,” Brennan said.

How we use our gifts

Is this a time-talent-treasure-reflection, on how we ascertain what our God-given strengths may be that we are encouraged to share with our church? Not this time; it's an endowment fund story.

A few months ago, my friend and neighbor's mom died unexpectedly, and the funeral was planned to be in her beloved church. This was the faith community of her childhood, where her wedding took place and where she worshipped currently. Being in a city not too far from Madison, I decided I would go to be there in support of my friend. I looked up Judy's obituary online, found the address to the church and learned that two suggested memorials were listed. One was that gifts be directed to the Endowment Fund of this church – a choice that always catches my eye.

In my work seeking special planned gifts and bequests for Bethel's longstanding Foundation, I've learned not all that

many churches have an established endowment – and of the few that do, not many of them actively seek long-range gifts in order to grow it. The focus often is (or needs to be) kept on annual giving. We're incredibly blessed here at Bethel that our forefathers had the vision to see what an endowment fund held in perpetuity could eventually be, and, for the past 40 years, have maintained a healthy balance between annual and planned giving emphasis. The forward-thinking projects and ministries that our Foundation has given life to is inspiring and impressive year after year – above and beyond, outside the box, great ideas from Bethelites.

So, I wrote my memorial check to the named church's endowment fund, put it with my sympathy card and set out for the funeral service. A month or so later, we received an acknowledgement letter from the treasurer of this fund. Poised to file it with our charitable giving records for tax

time, I read the sentence that stopped me cold: *This fund is held to provide for the maintenance of all the church facilities.* What? No vision/mission directed spending? Regular maintenance. I know it's necessary. Believe me, now from the business administrator's vantage point, I know it takes a good amount of contributed dollars each month to maintain our lovely and well-used facility. I just didn't want my memorial gift used that way.

This is what I leave you with: Know that when you support our Endowment Foundation – either with a memorial gift, a planned gift, or appreciated stock– it is invested wisely, held forever and used to support the dreams of future Bethel mission.

Improve your walk with God and feed the hungry – in 40 Days

During Lent, participants renewed their lives with God – and fed thousands of hungry people. The *40 Days of Spiritual Renewal* program helped make this possible. 2008 was the third year Bethel offered *40 Days*, which provides resources for daily prayer and scripture reading, weekly worship and Bible study – and the opportunity to complete one major service project. *Feeding 50,000* was this year's church-wide service component. The goal was to make, serve, buy or raise funds for 50,000 meals during Lent.



“Participants really stepped up to the plate and took this challenge to heart,” said Jacqui Shanda, Director of Education. “By Easter Monday, we more than doubled the 50,000 goal by providing 100,805 meals for the Madison community and Hephatha Lutheran Church in Milwaukee. It was a huge success.”

Nearly 700 people took part in the *40 Days of Spiritual Renewal* Bible studies; many more participated in the *Feeding 50,000* initiative. The Bethel Endowment Foundation supports projects that impact people's lives.



Katrina clean-up continues in New Orleans

It was August 2005 when Hurricane Katrina pummeled the Gulf Coast – taking lives and destroying homes. Thousands of survivors lost everything they owned.

Nearly three years later, the effects of this devastating storm linger. It could be at least seven more years before New Orleans is restored to the thriving, culture-rich city we remember.

“People are shocked, humbled and saddened by how fresh the devastation seems,” Pastor Rick Lund said. “In places, it looks like the storm hit only days before.”

Twelve Bethel members and other Lutherans from the Midwest are determined to help. The group traveled to New Orleans in January to help rebuild flood-damaged homes.

“There is hope and pride that the church and other organizations are

doing outstanding work that some government agencies have been slow to accomplish,” Pastor Lund said. “This was my fourth trip to New Orleans in the past year – and each time, participants express their willingness to go back to help more if they could.”

Rolling out a new reception area

First impressions – we all know how much they mean. A particular area will be making a very positive first impression. It’s Bethel’s reception area – one of the first things visitors see when they enter the building. And, later this summer, it will be a more attractive, welcoming, efficient and user-friendly area.

Remodeling will start in June. Projects include: adding a new mail station, front desk, counter and carpet. The back

closet door will be removed and cabinets will be installed, creating a functional workspace. The facade will be updated too – changing the square opening to a columned and arched opening that better complements the look of the gothic arches in our sanctuary.

A grant from the Bethel Endowment Foundation is helping this effort, which adds functionality for staff and creates an inviting atmosphere for visitors.

The Bethel Endowment Foundation supports this event and the parish nurse program.

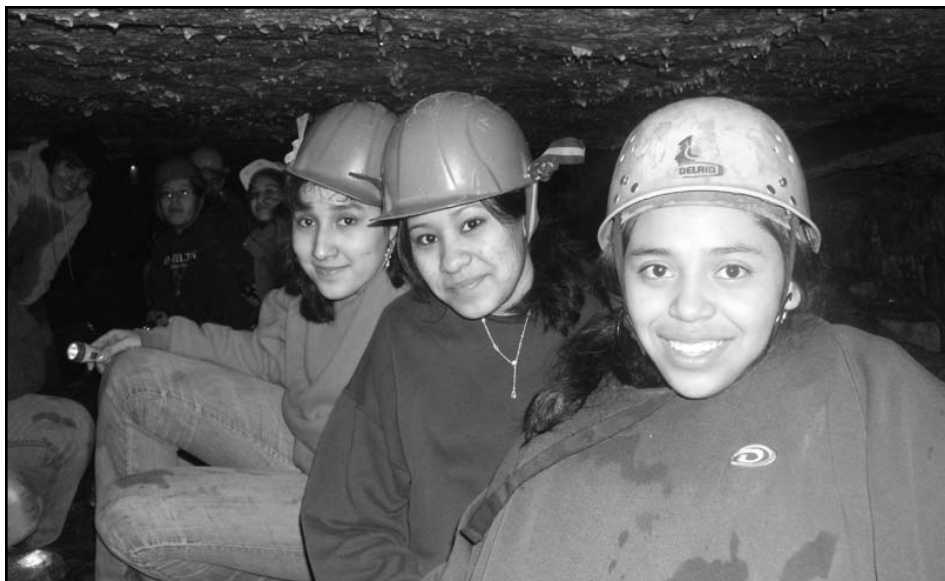


Latino youth build faith, friendships during “break” at camp

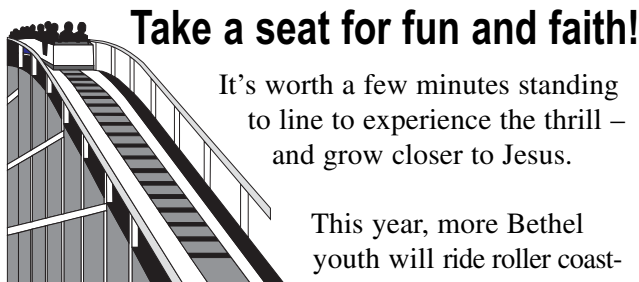

Care during crisis is key

We all experience difficult times in our lives. Having someone to lean on during those times is key to our emotional and spiritual well-being. Bethel's Stephen Ministry program provides compassion, care and long-term support to members facing a crisis.

Seventeen Bethel members have completed 50 hours of Stephen Ministry training and were commissioned for ministry in April. They have also committed to 18 months of supervision and continuing education on grief, depression and the

importance of confidentiality.



"Stephen ministers meet with the person they are matched with once a week for about an hour to listen, care, encourage and pray," Pastor Laura Sutherland said. "This ministry is much-needed in our congregation, and our Stephen ministers are an amazing group of people – we are so blessed to have them!"

This critical function of the care ministry is possible with funding from the Bethel Endowment Foundation.
