Listen! Listen again! God is calling...WHO is God calling? Are we listening? How would I know if God is calling ME? How should I answer? What options do I have?

Some people think that God only calls pastors. God knows better than THAT! God has far too much work to be done. Most of God's work would never get done if God called only pastors. Sometimes we can find good reasons why God should NOT be calling us. People throughout the Bible gave God good reasons (excuses?) why God should call someone else. Take some time: explore early responses of people as they heard God calling their name, and note God's response to them:

- **MOSES:** (Exodus 3 and 4) The text helps us know that Moses felt totally inadequate and scared to go to Pharaoh, and said to God: "Who am I that I should go?" (3:11) "What shall I say?" (3:13) "Suppose they don't believe me?" (4:1) and finally "...I have never been eloquent...I am slow of speech and slow of tongue." (4:10). Moses' resistance lasts for two entire chapters and God not only takes the necessary time to reassure him, but actually makes adjustments in accordance with Moses' concerns.
- **ISAIAH:** (Isaiah 6) Isaiah's resistance to God's call comes even before God speaks, as we hear Isaiah say: "Woe is me...for I am a man of unclean lips" (6:5) Again, God responds to Isaiah's fears by touching his lips with a burning coal, saying "...your guilt has departed." (6:7)

- **JEREMIAH:** (Jeremiah 1): (this was one of our readings for last Sun, Feb 3). After God tells Jeremiah that God's call to him was in place even before Jeremiah was born, Jeremiah expresses his self-perceived inadequacy: "...I do not know how to speak, for I am only a boy." (1:6) This time God simply reprimands him: "Do not say 'I am only a boy'...you shall speak whatever I command...do not be afraid."

Speaking for myself, I totally understand these responses/fears expressed by leaders who became, by God's empowerment, significant leaders for God's people; leaders who continue, these many centuries later, to inspire us towards more faithful serving through our own meager gifts for leadership.

Recently, at worship we wrestled with the question of whether or not we should embrace, in a personal way, Jesus' words of his own job description: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me to...bring good news...to proclaim release to captives... to bring recovery of sight to the blind...", etc., etc. (Luke 4:18ff)

When God allows us (or rather, empowers us with) the courage to take these words seriously as God-given license for living out our faith lives, we then are called to 'fill in the blank': "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me to _____. Prayerfully, each of us asks God's guidance to identify when and where and how that 'Spirit of the Lord' is leading us forward.

As Jeanne Hrovat, Jenee Jerome, Peder Moren, Pat Berry and Tom Stehr have

now completed their terms on our congregation's Joint Council, we express our sincere appreciation for their embrace of their God-given mission. We also welcome with similar appreciation all who have now stepped into those vacancies on our Joint Council, as well as all the returning and/or new members on our Ministry and Resource Teams.

These, indeed, are sacred callings. Yet, they are no more sacred than every single large or small way YOU have of embracing YOUR call to be Jesus' hands, heart, feet, mind, voice that energizes this very same "Spirit of the Lord" to a waiting and wanting world around us. Thank you for your faithful prayers to discern your 'Jesus' participation.

How do we dare to claim such bold and audacious 'anointing' of the Holy Spirit? Take your Bible. Read the accounts in the Gospel of John, where the risen Jesus appears to the amazed disciples, especially in chapter 20: "Peace be with you...as the Father has sent me, so I send you."

This mandate for mission comes directly from Jesus: to you, to me, to all who seek to be followers of Jesus, for the good of all creation. My prayers never cease for each and all of you, as you collect socks, feed the hungry, sew blankets for babies, sing your hearts out, sit with a lonely person on Sundays in the Emmaus or Fireside rooms, nurture/teach one or more of our many young people...and the list goes on and on and on. What a privilege to serve with you! Thanks be to God. 🌈

Madison Gas & Electric: Working for Sustainability

MGE is an investor-owned, regulated utility which provides electricity to all of Madison and surrounding suburbs, and gas service to a wider area. It is our energy lifeline, providing us very reliable power and warmth. It now has added the objective of fulfilling our local responsibility to fight climate change. MGE is shouldering this job through its Energy 2030 framework which is aligned to meet the goals of the U.S. Mid-Century Strategy for Deep Decarbonization.

The headline goal is to generate 30% of its power from renewable sources by 2030, most of which will be from new construction. Already, MGE has invested \$100 million in the 66 megawatt (MW) Saratoga wind farm in Iowa, and will create 100 MW more in two solar installations in Wisconsin. MGE is also committed to facilitating a 40% reduction in the greenhouse gas emissions of its customers by 2030 and 80% by 2050. To make this happen, MGE is encouraging energy conservation and supporting the sustainability plans of Madison and Dane County. It also expects to remain a strong business from economic growth and new energy demands from electric cars and buses.

Leah Samson, MGE Residential Services Manager, is an energy geek at MGE with a passion for sustainability and energy efficiency. In her current position at MGE she educates and engages customers about their energy use. She attended UW-Madison and has a degree in mechanical engineering. Previously she owned a sustainability consulting firm where she provided green building consulting and sustainability planning for clients.

Caring for Creation (C4C) partners with Caring for Social Justice (C4SJ). The shared vision of the two programs derives from the 4 Harmonies of the Bethel Bible Series: to live in harmony with environment, others, ourselves and God. After several forums on environmental issues, the series will continue with a workshop and Sunday forums in March and April, which will focus on Social Justice topics: "Empowering people to break the bias habit: creating inclusion and reducing bias" (March 2), and Issues of Social Justice in the Prison/Jail System.

Milwaukee 53206 Documentary



Donald Driver, one of our favorite Packer players, tells us in his autobiography that he grew up in Texas in a community where drug dealing and car theft were the way to compensate for extreme poverty and lack of other options. Donald, known as Quickie, sold drugs and stole cars starting in elementary school, and continued while he was in college. The woman whom he would later marry persuaded him to give up selling drugs, and also to not finance family members who were in that business. Had he not chosen to abide by her wishes, he may well have ended up arrested, and incarcerated under the Truth in Sentencing laws that have unfairly targeted men of color with very long sentences.

Over 20 years ago, Bethel Lutheran Church joined with a number of other southern Wisconsin churches to provide support for a mission church in the central area of Milwaukee. Since then, Hephatha Lutheran Church, located within zip code 53206, has grown in number of members, and in outreach and service to the community. The children in the Hephatha neighborhood grow up in a community like Donald Driver's in which drug dealing and other crime is just another kind of job.

The film "Milwaukee 53206" chronicles the harsh reality of those living in the 53206 zip code, from which a very high proportion of African American men are incarcerated for a very long time. In the film, we are introduced to family members of those affected, and can see the destructive effect this situation can have both on families and on the communities to which they belong.

This film will be shown on Feb 17 in Borgwardt Hall at 10:10am, presented by Caring for Social Justice, and supported by a grant from XYZ. A short discussion will follow. 🌈

People can act biased without realizing it. We unconsciously acquire attitudes, beliefs or behaviors – prejudices, stereotypes, discriminatory practices – that interfere with interpersonal and intergroup relations.

Vulnerable to bias...who, ME?

This Workshop is based on the idea that bias is a habit. And like all habits, it can be broken.
That’s a good thing!

It is based on Dr. Patricia Devine’s pioneering research (1989) into developing strategies to diminish bias and promote diversity. The results achieved by Drs. Devine and Cox are scientifically based – shown experimentally to produce lasting bias-reducing effects. Their research has investigated the multiple sources and factors influencing the development and durability of stereotypes and prejudice.

Behavioral change can occur if participants invest in the habits of change the workshop outlines.

- Motivation to address personal bias
- Awareness: Recognition and labeling of biased thinking
- Strategies to confront unwanted, non-inclusive habits
- Practice: Effort over time

Learn how bias is spread and how to make unconscious patterns conscious and intentional. All are invited to learn with us eye-opening insights in a self-discovery journey toward a more welcoming, inclusive community.



Patricia G. Devine, Ph.D.
Professor and Lab Director
UW Department of Psychology

Dr. Devine’s work is interested in how people manage the intrapersonal and interpersonal challenges associated with prejudice in our contemporary society. She is an internationally recognized expert in the scientific study of stereotyping, prejudice, and intergroup relations.



William T. L. Cox, Ph.D.
Assistant Scientist
UW Department of Psychology

Dr. Cox is a social psychologist whose scientific research has investigated the sources of stereotypes and prejudice – cultural, social, cognitive and neural mechanisms – leading to evidence-based ways to break the prejudice habit. Cox argues that understanding these bias perpetuation mechanisms is key to overcoming bias.

Understanding others means first understanding ourselves.
