THERE'S MORE HERE THAN MEETS THE EYE

Jesus's Incarnation

hen it comes to Christmas, almost everyone understands that it is the celebration of Jesus's birth. Christians see in this birth not just a human being but also the incarnation of God. Many see this as unique and unrepeated.

But for Martin Luther, the incarnation wasn't what we might call a "one off" or a "one and done" event, limited only to Jesus. For Luther, the incarnation but gets repeated over and over again. In one of his Christmas sermons, Martin Luther said:

"We see here how Christ, as it were, takes our birth from us and absorbs it in his birth, and grants us his, that in it we might become

pure and holy, as if it were our own, so that every Christian may rejoice and glory in Christ's birth as much as if he had himself been born of Mary as was Christ."

Luther taught that incarnation did not happen just once 2,000 years ago and never before and never since, but instead incarnation was present through the entire span

of the universe. The Divine One of eternity, who is beyond space and time, has become incarnate (physically and materially present) within the creation. What this means, good friend, is that you are also part of God's manifestation. In his



birth, Jesus takes on our being so completely that when he is born of Mary, so are we. What we, in the Western church, call "incarnation" and "salvation" has another name in the Eastern church: "divinization" (theosis). We become part of the divine. 2 Peter 1:4 says it plainly, "He has given us something very great and wonderful...you are able to become part of the divine nature!"

The Apostle Paul had the same view of the incarnation as he talked repeatedly about the fact that we are "in Christ". In fact, he uses the phrase more than 164 times. Paul's point, in the words of Richard Rohr, "is that all of us, without exception,

> are living inside of a cosmic identity, already in place, that is driving and guiding us forward. We are all en Cristo, willingly or unwillingly, happily or unhappily, consciously or unconsciously." Paul pointedly asks the followers of Jesus in the city of Corinth, "Do you acknowledge that Jesus Christ is really in you?" (2 Corinthians 13:5-6). And he tells the Christians in the region of Galatia

that "God revealed his Son in me" (Galatians 1:16).

In Luke's nativity story, Jesus is called a "light to the nations." But light is less something you actually see than something that allows you to see all other things. Having "faith" in Jesus means seeing the Holy Divine not in one person alone but how God is manifest in the entire cosmos.

Bethel Horizons Campaign Raises \$3.5 Million

You did it! You all have helped Bethel Horizons to meet our goal of \$3.5 million pledged toward the Horizons 50th Capital Campaign. In March, just as COVID-19's effects became realized, we were nearly \$400,000 away from our goal. Despite the challenges of COVID-19, this \$400,000 in commitments was realized during the past several months. Praise the Lord!

This work would not have been possible without the tireless efforts of our 50th Capital Campaign Committee. This committee was co-chaired by Jack Salzwedel and Dale Mathwich. Members also included Alice Mowbray, Sigrid Knuti and Phil Pielage.

This goal was realized with over 230 people/families providing a pledge in 18 months! This fundraiser is the largest fundraiser by far in Bethel Horizons history and will help set the course for the new Bethel Horizons Master Plan. Over 70% of these pledges have been paid off and the rest of the pledges are due to be paid off by the end of 2022.

Merry Christmas From A Call to Justice and Mercy

In 1958 when Martin Luther King Jr was stabbed by a deranged woman in Harlem and nearly died, he was visited in the hospital by his mentor, a pastor named Howard Thurman. King asked Thurman, "Where do I go from here?" We might ask the same question.

Thurman was a teacher, pastor, and mentor to leaders of the civil rights movement. He visited Gandhi in India and returned to preach non-violent social activism and to change history. Yet his most remembered advice is this:

"Don't ask what the world needs, ask what makes you come alive, and go do it, because what the world needs are people who have come alive."

Christmas is when we celebrate coming alive. God coming alive in humanity. Coming to live with us. Coming alive in us.

As we face 2021, we ask: "Where do I go from here?" God's answer: Come alive with me.

Now Here's Something to Celebrate!

A Financial Update from Treasurer Paul Aspinwall

THANKS. I am thankful for the efforts of Bethel Lutheran Church (BLC) Assistant Treasurer Carrie Arneson, and the Financial Resources (FR) team of Jan Primus, Nate Kublank, Gary Hertel, Tim Semman, and Scott LaMontagne. We have been assisted throughout the year by Accountant Laurie Plum and Accounting Support Specialist Dona Meyer, who stepped in when Penny Duane resigned. The FR team also benefits from the historical knowledge and perspective from Alice Mowbray, Director of Development, and from Pastor Mike Brown.

ACCOUNTING. Carrie has done great work at simplifying and clarifying the accounting reports. While the target is to move towards Generally **Accepted Accounting Principles** (GAAP), BLC is not required to fully adopt GAAP, but we are closing the gap to GAAP, as it were. In November, the Joint Council approved getting a fulltime, CPA-qualified Director of Accounting. This was among the recommended improvement from Wegner CPAs consulting people who primarily work with churches and other non-profits.

POLICY. FR team first worked on a revision to the Undesignated

Bequests and Memorials policy, and took that to the Joint Council, which approved it early in the year. It was on-time as Bethel has seen several undesignated bequests this year. Mostly they have been added to our general income, but in a few cases where Alice had worked with the people, a portion of the funds were moved to designated areas; the largest example being to use part of a six-figure estate to finish the Bethel Horizons campaign with a \$50,000 gift.

Then, FR, led by Gary Hertel and Nate Kublank, took an Operating Reserve Fund policy and a Savings Fund Policy to the Joint Council this fall, and the Joint Council approved both. For the FR discussion on size of the funds, we consulted with Walter Dewey, head of the Bethel Endowment Foundation (BEF), and agreed with approximately three months of expenses for the

Operating Reserve Fund and six months or more of expenses for the Savings Fund; the Savings Fund will be invested with BEF.

2020 BUDGET – REVENUE. Thank you to all who have remained givers throughout this separated year. Including October, Pledged Income is on track to match the pledged amount. With no in-church since March, Unpledged Income is lagging but could still end up two-thirds of budget. Loose Plate gets hit even harder with no in-church, but even there some people are giving and we could still end up over half of budget. Church



use income is the biggest other shortfall, and it is unclear what Christmas giving will be. Parking Lot income is down as several renters had no use for the slot after stay-at-home push; several renters are still paying for slots even as they aren't fulling using them. Our budget was made whole on the revenue side with two items – the undesignated bequests mentioned above (over \$200,000 in total), and the Federal Government's Paycheck Protection Program, where most churches applied and were loaned money to keep people employed; we received \$310,000. Application for forgiveness of repayment on

the Paycheck Protection Program funds (\$310,000) is underway, and expected to occur.

2020 BUDGET – EXPENSES. The lack of in-church has lowered several expense areas, particularly for food (coffee bar and meals for funerals and weddings), and utilities. In addition, no printing of bulletins has lowered that expense. We are only over on Benevolences, primarily driven by the \$50,000 for the Bethel Horizons campaign that was covered by part of one of the undesignated bequests.

2021 PLEDGES. Even without an in-church pledge Sunday, over 160 of your friends have already pledged. It is not too late, and we look for you to join us as we plan for 2021.

Realm Corner

Where can I find contact information for other Bethel Members?

Many of you remember the Bethel Directory Book. It was a great resource, where you could find the pictures of your Bethel friends along with their contact information (phone numbers, address, etc.). An asset when the holidays came along and you wanted to send a Christmas card, a card on their birthday or just a little note to say that you were thinking of them.

Where can we find this information, now that we do not have a Bethel Directory? We actually do have a Bethel Member Directory and it is in Realm.

Realm is our church database with all of our member information. If you are a member of Bethel you are in a group in Realm called "Bethel Member Directory". This group gives you access to the contact information of other members, like the old "Bethel Directory Book". The difference is, it is more up to date than the old directory books. If a member family moved right after the book was published people would only have had access to their old address. With Realm, if members keep their profiles updated, by updating it themselves, or sending new information to the Ministry Support Specialist, you will always have access to their current contact information.

Remember one thing, just like the old directory book, people are always welcome to their privacy. Some members opted out of being in the directory book because they did not want their contact information "out there". Now-a-days, "out there" means on the web and the same is true. People may not want their contact information available for everyone.

In Realm, your information is more secure than the old directory book.

First, only members are given a login to access Realm.

Second, only members are put in the group "Bethel Member Directory".

Third, and most importantly, members have the ability to set their own Privacy Settings (the topic of my next Realm tutorial) giving them the control over who, within Bethel, is able to access their contact information. Sometimes, if you are not able to access a member's information, it may be that their privacy setting is set to Staff Only (meaning that only church staff can see their information).

How do you access the contact information for Bethel Members?

- 1. Sign into Realm using your account email and your password.
- 2. In the left-hand column, under the Bethel logo... Click on "Groups".
- 3. Click on "Bethel Member Directory".
- 4. In the horizontal bar under Bethel Member Directory... Click on "Participants".
- 5. You can either scroll down through the almost 3000 members or you can use the search bar which is located in the right-hand corner to the left of your name.
- 6. Type in the persons name and their information will come up. Be sure to spell their name correctly because Realm is very picky. If you are not sure how to spell the last name you can search just the first name and the first letter of their last name and then scroll through. If you don't see what you are looking for, click on more to see more names.
