It's Time for a Standing Ovation!

What began on March 12, 2020 with the announcement from Governor Tony Evers of a Public Health Emergency due to COVID-19 is coming to an end on June 2, 2021. The pandemic, which brought so much misery, fear, death, hardship, and frustration, is being brought under control by the several effective vaccines and the aggressive drive to get people vaccinated. Shortly after the onslaught of the pandemic, Bethel formed a task force to study, monitor, and recommend actions and protocols to help keep members of Bethel safe during the long months. This task force consisted of scientists, physicians, attorneys, facilities personnel, and others. They met near weekly for close to a year to decipher the many changes that accompanied the very fluid and politically-charged situation. It is due to this task force that Bethel was so effective at reading the continually evolving situation and adapting. It is to the Bethel COVID-19 Task Force that the Bethel community owes effusive gratitude and approbation. The members of the task force include Heather Moen (chair), Greg Moses, Denis/Laura Vogel, Mike/Bev Thom, Craig Gjerde, Kim Kindschi, Kathy Pielage, Judy Armelin, Steve Lawrence, and Eric Knueve. In light of the high rate of vaccination, low rate of infection, and lifting of all county mandates, the task force recommends removing all Bethel COVID related policies, including mask mandate, sign-in procedures, capacity limits, and restrictions on singing and fellowship, effective June 2, 2021.

We recommend that the church acknowledge that some individuals remain unvaccinated at this time, and congregants will have varying degrees of comfort with communal worship. We advise continuing to offer online worship and welcoming people to wear masks or not, as they choose. Our sanctuary is large enough to accommodate physical distancing of people who wish to maintain distance, but this

does not need to be enforced by ushers, and no pews need to be blocked off. Bethel can continue to offer individual communion cups to people who prefer to take communion in their pews, either due to mobility issues, personal preference or for distancing reasons, but traditional communion at the front of the church can resume. People may choose to enjoy fellowship with refreshments in the Emmaus room, take their refreshments outside, or leave directly after worship. There should be no restrictions on Weddings, Funerals, meetings or other uses of the Bethel facility.

All current mandates remain in effect until **June 2, 2021.**


The COVID Task Force has adjourned indefinitely. The Joint Council is welcome to convene us at any time in the future if the need arises.

BETHEL PARTLY POWERED BY SOLAR

Bethel Lutheran Church is taking another step toward greater sustainability, partnering with Madison Gas and Electric (MGE) to power its facility with solar energy from a 5-megawatt (MW) solar array at Middleton Municipal Airport. Bethel's 761 shares of local solar will provide enough clean energy to power approximately 50% of its electricity usage and will help offset about 402,892 pounds of carbon dioxide annually. Caring for creation is an article of faith for Bethel. The

words from the Bible "for God so loved the world [cosmos]" resonate deep within us and call us to love what God loves.

Because of this, few issues are more urgent than stopping and reversing the global trend toward environmental collapse. The Shared Solar program provides Bethel the opportunity to help do just that in partnership with

MG&E. Morey Field Solar is the second array in MGE's popular Shared Solar program.



The expansion of the program gives residential and business customers throughout MGE's electric service territory the option of powering their home or business with locally generated solar energy. MGE's first Shared Solar project is a 500-kilowatt array on the roof of Middleton's Municipal Operations Center. It began serving customers in Jan 2017. The new array began delivering energy to our community grid in Aug 2020. Shared Solar participants like Bethel Lutheran Church are helping MGE to reach its goal of net-zero carbon electricity by 2050. 🌍

ACTJAM Interviews Strong Baby Staff

The May 19 Bethelite reported how Bethel's Food Pantry is supporting the Strong Baby Sanctuary at Hephatha Lutheran Church in Milwaukee, a church supported by Bethel. Strong Baby Sanctuary is a city-wide program in Milwaukee that began in 2015 to reduce infant mortality. Bethel's social justice ministry (ATJAM) sat down with Elisha Branch from Hephatha's Strong Baby Sanctuary Leadership team and Parish Nurse Chris Keim to talk about the love and support that Strong Baby brings to the community.

What do you do as a Strong Baby Sanctuary?

Elisha: One Saturday a month we have a luncheon at the church and then we provide resources like diapers. We have an informational piece and then we tie a meditation or devotion into it.

How does church make a difference?

Chris: The first of the year we had a mom

who lost a baby. She was due in February and she lost the baby on Jan 1. It was very devastating. What we did at our January meeting was we supported her. She came and Pastor Mary Martha did a service honoring the baby and the mom. There was so much support. Then a lot of the moms sent cards to her and reached out to her on Facebook. It's just a way of connecting these young people. They're suffering. In the last three years we've had three young moms have stillborn babies.

What's the impact?

Elisha: The impact is the relationships that are being created and the conversations we're hearing that we haven't heard before.

Chris: The issues that these moms face – many of them, really probably all of them – stem from systemic racism. I don't think this program is trying to change systemic racism. This program is working in the community that is most affected and trying to do some healing and be a support system so parents can do what they can to help them make good

choices, learn and make the best decisions they can for parenting.

What does Strong Baby mean to you?

Chris: I've been around Hephatha for 16 years and before that I was the school nurse at Hopkins down the street. It's through Hephatha that I've come to truly understand how God really works with money. It's all God's. If I have a mom in need, she's getting what she needs [and] God is going to renew it. You may not know what direction it's going to come from but it's going to come from somewhere.

Elisha: I'm a volunteer. I love to do it. My daughter [Daisy] was the first Strong Baby Sanctuary baby at Hephatha. After the program helped me, I wanted to help others. It's an amazing program and important for our church and community to have.


