## Extra and special music during this unusual year



Director of Music Amy Hartsough sought to reallocate a related music grant to be used instead for hiring special music/musicians for most all of our worship experiences in the past months.

### **How your Foundation helped!**

More than 230 Bethel families have been involved to date with providing for a pledge toward the Bethel Horizons capital campaign recognizing the first 50 years of our wholly owned camp being in existence.

This \$3.5 million dollar campaign that is now fully pledged as of October, will position the beautiful camp property to increase capacity for growth into the next 50 years.

To this end, the Bethel Endowment Foundation has now committed \$50,000 toward this effort, as voted on at the July quarterly meeting – and as a symbiotic bookend, Bethel Lutheran Church Council has likewise committed \$50,000 from a recent bequest received to support this once in a lifetime effort supported by so many Bethelites.

The campaign committee and Horizons board is so grateful for these two significant major gifts. We truly are all in this together.

# Intentional outreach

The way to grow a church is to reach new people. This means spreading the word about Bethel to various ages, groups, ethnicities and backgrounds of people through multiple platforms.

Bethel is doing exactly that through vehicles like Facebook advertising for events such as drive-in movies, drive-up church and other events.

Another strategy is sending welcoming postcards, one of which is sent monthly to people who move within three miles of Bethel.

“It is important to keep Bethel in front of Madison residents and students consecutively to keep familiarity with our church,” said Christal Swigart, Director of



Communications. “Once we get people in the doors of Bethel, they stay.”

# What does the Middle East have to do with Bethel?

This year has been one like no other. We keep saying that as if it's soon to be 'set back' or feeling more normal once again. But in reality, we don't know the resolution or the timing or what shall follow in terms of worldwide anxiety.

But in the midst of this, we read a news report or two or three of peace agreements struck in the Middle East between nations that have been warring forever, or for at least centuries.

And in maps detailing who lives where, it reminds me of the graphics we used to study over in Sunday School – to get a sense of where the Israelites trod, where Jesus walked and where Paul taught – halfway around the world from where we live.

The waters of the Dead Sea and the Sea of Galilee were in many stories, as water is so and was so all important to where people could sustain life.

Nearly two decades ago, I heard the analogy of these two Seas as they relate to charitable giving or stewarding the gifts given to each of us. I love the visual, comparing Scarcity and Abundance. The Dead Sea, while beautifully aqua colored, extracts life from its water but gives no life. It receives

nutrients and minerals from the Jordan River but has no outlet.

The depth of the river provides for the lowest point on Earth, and the desert around it receives just over two inches of rain annually.

Some say that the sins washed away in the many Jordan River baptisms, create this veritable pool of iniquity! This feels dead ended, self absorbed and dark as I write this story. It takes and takes in order to survive but provides for no creation. This must be scarcity.

The smaller and likewise beautiful Sea of Galilee has its water source to the north of the Dead Sea and then feeds into the Jordan River, which then flows into the stagnant Dead Sea.

But the Sea of Galilee is teeming with fish and sustained plant life along the shores. Surely this is abundance. Taking life giving water in but then having water flow out and onward.

Acts 20:35 says it's more blessed to give than to receive.

And so is the work of your Endowment Foundation – gratefully receiving gifts in through bequests or memorial

# From Generation to Generation

Just as many programs, events and activities were modified this year because of COVID-19, so was Vacation Bible Camp. VBC @ Home - From Generation to Generation offered something for everyone through Bethel's website.

At minimum, 20 people collaborated to create videos and activities ranging in age from 6 to 76. The program included 46 videos, accessible from the Bethel website, YouTube and/or social media, falling into six categories: Bible Story with Heather, Activity (art, environment education, team building and more), Connection (relating the bible story to your everyday life and community), Candle Talk, Music & Movement and Bible

Background & Encouragement for Parents.

The average number of views for VBC @ Home videos was 45, with some of our higher view counts being well over 100. Additionally, about 40 families picked up take-home materials.

## Seminary Scholarships

**2020-21 recipients:** Laura Jasiczek, Lakeview Lutheran Church, Madison, Tom Kreis, Norway Grove Lutheran Church, DeForest, Kathi Matthews-Risley, St. John's Lutheran Church, Prairie du Sac, and James Ranney, Two Steeples Parish, Springdale Lutheran Church, Mt.Horeb, All of these students are enrolled at Wartburg Seminary.

The Bethel Endowment Foundation's Cephas Johnson Seminary Scholarship has provided financial assistance since 1990 to students (including non-Bethel members from Dane County) attending an ELCA seminary on ordination track. The cost for three academic years can easily exceed \$100,000, making this scholarship vital for many seminarians.

Bethel has helped fund the educations of more than 100 Lutheran pastors and is working on its second hundred. With close to 10,000 individual churches in the ELCA, few of those come close to Bethel's level of financial commitment in supporting the next generation of pastoral leaders. In the 1970s, Richard Shimon established a Bethel memorial fund to support seminarians. Then a decade later, 94-year-old Bethel leader Cephas Johnson died. But before he reached his heavenly destination, he reached deep into his pockets and left a \$1 million gift to the church. Of that bequest to the Bethel Endowment Foundation, much of it goes to support seminarians.

## Energy efficiency efforts

It is important to maintain the space where we come together to make friends, support each other and worship. Last year, the Bethel Endowment Foundation funded an energy audit that identified improvements that would save energy and reduce utility costs.

One project was rebuilding or replacing steam traps. This work has been completed and should result in natural gas savings. We also have plans to replace leaking boiler valves.

### Occupancy sensors

The process also is underway to add occupancy sensors to the areas of the building where lights tend to be left on when the space is unoccupied. Additionally, heater controls on three entrances to the facility have been installed. These controls allow for programming of occupied versus unoccupied times and can adjust the set point temperature accordingly.

Grants from the Bethel Endowment Foundation support efforts like this that help save energy and money.

## Women's retreat

In October, a small group of Bethel women gathered for an annual retreat to connect, recharge and deepen their faith. They took time for fellowship, personal care and a study of Psalm 46:10.



Grants from the Bethel Endowment Foundation help cover the cost of educational retreats that allow women to come together, learn about themselves and deepen their spirituality.

Then in October, Arlen Christenson decided that after 32 years of serving this Foundation as Registered Agent, he too is ready to turn over the reins to another Bethel leader. We too are so thankful for his well respected legal expertise and interest in keeping Bethel the solid downtown force for good that it’s been for 165 years.

Imagine, trying to affix value to this nearly six decades of undying service to our church’s unique asset! To offer our heartfelt appreciation seems too little – so we did choose two similar art pieces crafted by an Adamah related clay artist that signify arms raised in celebration of such good works undertaken and stewarded so skillfully. These statues were presented to them each via the quarterly Zoom meetings, and then delivered to their homes, along with a small supply of Madison made quality chocolates.

Al Schultz has been named to replace Fred as trustee, and comes to this position with much Bethel history and leadership experience under his belt – having joined here with his wife Wendy in 1976. He recently retired from his long time executive position with Vita Plus, and has also been
