## TESTING GOD'S PROMISES

In *The Lord of the Rings*, Tolkien writes about a kingdom called Gondor which for many years has had no king. While waiting for the rightful heir to come and claim his throne, a series of stewards are placed in charge to manage the land. The steward in charge at the time of the events described in the book is named Denethor. He has two sons, Boromir and Faramir. As steward of the land, Denethor has the power of the king but without the title and without the full measure of honor. He could make decisions and pass judgment. He received the respect and admiration of the people of the land. But his primary task was to do whatever was best for the land in the absence of its rightful ruler. In all he did, he was to remember his position—to remember that he was not, and never would be, the king. As a constant reminder of his temporary position he was forbidden to rule seated on the king's throne. While the king was allowed the full honor of sitting upon the throne, surrounded by splendor, the steward was consigned to rule from a plain, unadorned chair that sat at the foot of the throne. Denethor was not a very good steward. He dreaded the day the king would return, for he knew that with the return of the king, would come his own return to obscurity. He jealously guarded the power that had been given him and did not look forward to the day when he would have to relinquish the kingdom to its rightful owner. This attitude affected his every decision, and he often ruled based on his own desire for preservation rather than on the basis of what would be best for the kingdom he was sworn to protect.

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Denethor became corrupt. He claimed what had been entrusted to him as his own rightful possession. This claim led to his own corruption.

This concept of stewardship is one that has been largely lost to our time and our culture. We understand ownership, borrowing, leasing, and mortgaging but have little knowledge of stewardship. Yet, it is a bedrock principle in the Bible. Scripture tells us that we are to see everything we have as belonging to God. We are stewards, not owners. Psalm 24:1 states "Everything in all the creation belongs to God." This can be a hard truth to accept. It certainly was for Denethor. Drunk with corruption and power and unwilling to hand over the kingdom, the steward of Gondor, eventually took his own life, ending his years of poor stewardship. He would rather die than give up what he thought was

his. He would rather die than humble himself before the king.

Denethor's son, Faramir, took his father's place as the next in a long line of stewards. And no sooner did he do this than the king, Aragorn, returns to the throne. Faramir faces the same decision as his father. And when the new king is crowned, it is Faramir who leads the cries of "Behold the king!" Faramir was everything his father was not. He was a good and faithful steward who looked forward to the return of his king and who was willing and ready to hand what had been entrusted to him to its rightful owner. Faramir showed that he was trustworthy. And his trust was rewarded. As followers of Jesus Christ and believers in scripture, we are promised a reward for being trustworthy stewards. In Malachi 3:10, God

says through the prophet:

"Bring the full 10% into the storehouse, so that there may be food in my house, and thus put me to the test, says the Lord of hosts; see if I will not open the windows of heaven for you and pour down for you an overflowing blessing."

## Putting God to the test.

This is the only verse in the Bible where the Almighty invites us to "test" God. "Try me," God declares. And you will see how I flood your life with the good life. Karin and I can say that this is absolutely true. We have been tithers

# STEPHEN MINISTRY

## Your 'Listening Ear' Could Be Just What This Ministry Needs

Stephen Ministry is a service offered by Bethel to individuals during periods of stress in their life. This service has been used by individuals dealing with issues such as death of a loved one, divorce, serious illness, job loss, divorce, difficult family situations and facing end of life.

Stephen Ministry provides caring, trustworthy, compassionate, confidential, faithful Christian care for individuals during these times by meeting with Care Receivers for one hour once a week. These meetings occur in a private setting without distractions. Men meet with men and women meet with women. During the meeting the Stephen Minister provides a listening, empathetic, non-judgmental ear for the Care Receiver. This is a process-oriented meeting that may include sharing bible and spiritual readings. Prayer is usually a part of each visit however Care Receivers who decline prayer during the visit are assured that they are in the Stephen Minister's prayers. The length of the Stephen Ministry relationship is dependent on the nature of the situation. Issues such as loss related to aging or end of life may last as long as the Care receiver is

alive. Issues such as dealing with situations such as divorce would be only until the individual no longer felt the need for a Stephen Minister.

Training for new Stephen Ministers is done at Bethel. Classes are taught by Stephen Ministry leaders who have undergone an in-depth week of training by staff from Stephen Ministry St Louis. The class to become Stephen Ministers consists of pre-class readings and fifty hours of in-class meetings. These meetings occur in the evening for two hours a week with a weekend retreat toward the end of the classes. Textbooks and all reading material for the class is provided by Bethel. Upon completion of the class an individual is fully prepared to become a Stephen Minister.

# MAKING GREAT TRADITIONS TOGETHER

This recipe is from Pennsylvania Dutch settlers at the time of colonies. They made these at Thanksgiving and stored them in a stoneware crock until Christmas.

## Ingredients

7 ounces light brown sugar  
9 Tablespoons cocoa powder  
10 ounces butter; softened  
1 pinch cinnamon  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 pound plain flour  
(approximately)



## Instructions

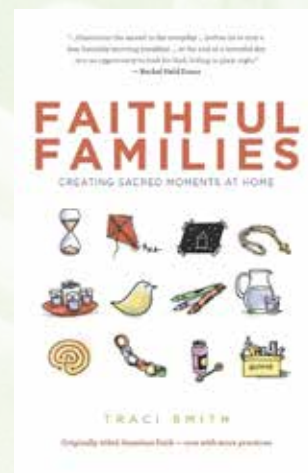
Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F. Mix all of the ingredients together, except for the flour. Add the flour slowly to the

rest of the mixture until it reaches the right consistency to roll out. The dough should be quite soft. (You may find it easier to knead it with your hands.

Roll out on a floured surface to a thickness of about 1/4 inch and cut into decorative shapes with small cookie cutters, a sharp knife or the rim of a glass.

Place on a greased baking sheet and bake in the oven for about 87 minutes. Remove from the oven while they are still soft and cool on a rack, then pack into crocks or jars. You may glaze. 🍪
