# Caring4Creation promotes environmental awareness

As Lutheran Christians, we are called to care for others and for the Earth – to live in harmony with the environment, others, ourselves and God. This compels us to raise awareness of the global and local threats to human welfare and the natural world from pollution, mismanagement and waste.

Since 2016, Caring for Creation (C4C) has produced more than 20 well-attended environmental awareness programs. Adapting to the pandemic in 2020, programs were shifted to Zoom.

This year, C4C plans to enhance its series of environmental programs with a mix of Zoom webinars and in-person events. They will focus on connecting climate responsibilities and social justice.

Webinars this year have included:

- Coexistence with wildlife: Dr. Adrian Treves, Professor of Environmental Studies at UW-Madison
- Madison's Lakeshore Nature
   Preserve and the importance of experiencing nature: Dr. Gisela Kutzbach
- Grassland 2.0 Restoring Prairie and People to Agriculture with Randy Jackson, Campbell-Bascom Professor of Grassland

## What's new at Horizons?

Thanks to a grant from the Bethel Endowment Foundation, a number of improvements are in the works at Bethel Horizons, including:

- The Barn Retreat Center Siding. New siding has been installed in several areas where existing siding deteriorated or was infiltrated by birds.
- **Prairie Center Bedroom** Moisture Issues. Seventeen new A/C units were ordered for the 16 bedrooms and the apartment in the Prairie Center. These new

- units are appropriately sized for the bedrooms and should do a better job of pulling moisture out of the rooms as they are cooled.
- Adamah Improvements. Site improvements are being planned at the Adamah art studio. With increasing construction costs. some modifications are being made to stay within budget for this project.
- Ropes Course Strandvise. The remaining strandvises need to be removed from the ropes

course to be in compliance with a new update. The hardware replacement is being scheduled. We have been eliminating strandvises from our ropes course as we made upgrades since 2007.


A grant from the Bethel Endowment Foundation covered the cost of a study guide for the Gospel of Luke, the 40-day devotional and other materials that made this experience possible.

## Engaging community, sparking interest in Bethel

Hundreds of Bethel members and friends gathered in January for the 2022 kickoff of The Bethel Speaker Series. The evening featured a thought-provoking presentation by Michio Kaku, one of the world's most sought-after astrophysicists.

Steeped in two religious traditions, Kaku has a deep sensitivity to the reality and power of religious influences and scientific realities. He is a professor of theoretical physics at the City College of New York and CUNY Graduate Center. Kaku also authored several best-selling books, and made appearances on TV and radio as well as in film.

Raised with Buddhist parents while attending a Christian private school,



Kaku offers tremendous insight into the nature of the relationship between faith and religion.

Plans are under way to host another dynamic speaker at Bethel this fall.

### Opening our doors

The Speaker Series, which is open at no cost to the community, creates a compelling reason for visitors to step inside and discover Bethel. It's an invitation for them to learn how our downtown city church is the place for deep thinking and leadership on relevant topics.

To individuals without a spiritual home, the Speaker Series may be the beginning of a fulfilling worship community experience.

Funding from the Bethel Endowment Foundation helps cover the cost of this valuable format, which made its resurgence last fall following a hiatus during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic.

## Katie's corner

In 2021, the unused grant for the women's triennial conference was asked to be repurposed for use in updating meeting room 200, into a complementary room adjacent to the Martin Luther meeting room 201.

The amount of \$8,500 was perfect in providing for three new commercial grade sofas, six upholstered chairs and a few side tables

Five gifted leather club chairs from The Edgewater, a donated electric fireplace, plus a few resale shop finds (rose embossed coffee table, two café lamps, a mirror, some artwork) nearly finished the space.

An historic weaving from Bethel's art collection crafted in Norway more than 100 years ago adorns a wall space, and several depictions of Katie Luther hang on the walls. The new large screen smart TV allows for virtual meetings as well as program viewing.

A few plants, a kitschy cuckoo clock and throw pillows – the latter made by a crafty seamstress from our quilt making group – create a very pleasant gathering space for three to nearly 20 participants. It is already attracting many group uses.

# Supporting the Bethel Series worldwide

The Bethel Series debuted more than 60 years ago at Bethel Lutheran Church, and it continues to make an impact worldwide. The Bethel Series study uses an historical approach to the Hebrew-Christian heritage of faith with an overview of the Old and New Testaments.

Churches in 47 denominations have chosen the Bethel Series as their basic adult education tool. The text is in the language of the lay person, and the course is effective in small or large congregations. A grant from the Bethel Endowment Foundation is helping to offer the Bethel Series to areas where lack of funding is a barrier.

#### Areas of focus

The Bethel Series: Teaching the Bible Around the World in 2022 will focus on three projects:

 Chinese Language Outreach. Since 2007, Bethel has supported Reverend Qiu Lin, a Chinese missionary, who has taught the Bethel Series in secret to more than 1,000 Chinese pastors. These brave pastors continue to teach the Bethel Series in Chinese underground churches.

It is unlikely to be safe in the foreseeable future for Lin to teach in China, so he is currently teaching the Bethel Series in Mandarin Chinese to Chinese American and Canadian pastors. Funding from the Bethel Endowment Foundation will provide scholarships for enrollment fees for five small Chinese American churches and 50 Chinese lesson books.

Costa Rican Bethel Series Training. Bethel supports Bethel Series teaching in Bajo Barrantes in the mountains of San Ramon in Costa Rica. Funding from the Bethel Endowment Foundation will provide





30 lesson books and bibles for longtime Bethel Series teacher Patricia Vargas to use in her teachings.

 Scholarships for International Teaching Ministries. Funding from the Bethel Endowment Foundation will provide scholarships for three new international teaching ministries this year.

## Welcoming building improvements

Several building improvement projects recently were completed at Bethel, funded by the Bethel Endowment Foundation.

A new Welcome sign now graces the reception desk. It is backlit, making it highly visible and attention grabbing. The previous "Welcome To Bethel" sign was difficult to see, so when people unfamiliar with the building walked in, it was not obvious that the reception desk is on the first floor and not at the parking lot lobby.

A host of improvements also were made at Bethel's Ceremonial Entrance. Daniel's construction removed the

cracked semi-circular concrete walk, the first step to the entry and the lone handrail that was still in place. Two new handrails were installed at that entry, a popular photo-op backdrop – especially for weddings.

Wrought iron lattice work at the top of the arch was soda blasted clean and repainted. The concrete semi circular sidewalk was replaced. This project was unique in that it was cost-shared by a generous Bethel member.

Mid-year grants from the Bethel Endowment Foundation made these projects possible.

### Rebuilding at Bethel

When a relationsip ends, we feel many emotions – from sadness and loss to everything in between. Additionally, those going through separation and divorce often face severe financial struggles along with emotional and mental trials. This can make it difficult for them to access the support they need.

Grants from the Bethel Endowment Foundation provide partial scholarships for the Rebuilding at Bethel program, which includes a fall retreat. Rebuilding at Bethel helps individuals navigate life after a break up. It offers a safe place to share thoughts and feelings as well as find information, guidance, support and friendship.



Through the Rebuilding process, participants discover a new awareness of their personal growth potential. This non-denominational series offers three different approaches to the recovery process.

### Investment Committee, continued from back

That's significant – and will be helpful as we move through the rest of the year. As of close of March, the stocks were 69.6% of the total, bonds laddered out over the coming seven+ years are 24.6%, leaving the remainder in cash at 5.8% - having ample cash on hand provides good opportunity for reinvesting at the once-a-month meetings, as the market ebbs and flows.

The memory of longtime committee chair George Austin is honored each and every time this group of Bethel professionals meet. Their volunteer work and expertise shared saves Bethel paying any management fee over the past nearly six decades. For this, we are all very thankful.

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## Investment results 2021 and first quarter 2022



We have a lot to be thankful for at Bethel – in the midst of these turbulent economic times, the steady hands guiding your Endowment Foundation investment portfolio continue to take the long view and focus

on value versus growth category assets.

The discipline exhibited during their monthly meetings conveys a sense of measured calm - they take their fiduciary task very much to heart as they work to protect the buying power of all gifts held in perpetuity.

The results for last year was an impressive 3.4 points over the benchmark of 12.9%, and over the past thirty years of analysis, the average annual gain of 8.7% outpaced the benchmark – on average – by .8 points.

We all know that this calendar year is quite different than the previous – for a variety of reasons. But yet, even in experiencing loss overall on the balanced port-folio for the first quarter of just under 3%, this is better than the benchmark results by nearly 2 points.
