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WRAPPED IN LOVE COVERED IN GRACE

pril 25 marked the eighth anniversary of the deadly earthquake that struck Nepal in 2015. Its toll was huge, killing nearly 9,000 people, injuring 20,000 more and destroying more than 600,000 homes. A second earthquake hit on May 12, causing more damage and casualties. Together, the suffering they caused was incalculable. Bethel's support since then has made possible a relief response that began almost immediately and a recovery process that is ongoing. Lutheran World Relief (LWR) was already working in Nepal with existing development programs close to the epicenter, and there they mobilized an emergency response within the first 24 hours after the first earthquake hit. In the immediate aftermath,

LWR staff, in cooperation with local partners distributed food packs, Quilts, Personal Care Kits, water filtration units, tarpaulins and corrugated galvanized iron sheets to affected families most in need. In the months that followed dwellings were built. Today, despite well-documented delays caused by internal political issues, the process of recovery has come a long way, and continues as families work with local government officials and organizations like LWR to build permanent houses designed to with stand future earthquakes. Thanks to Bethel's support through LWR drives, houses are being completed in several poor, rural and isolated villages with quilts and kits providing necessary care. Families displaced by the earthquake once again have a place they can call home.

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Stories like this are among the reasons Lutheran World Relief is consistently listed among the top relief agencies in the world by charity watchers. In 2021, LWR added a new accolade to its long list of awards and rankings. The Quilters Hall of Fame, in Marion, IN, honored LWR with a special award for its historic contributions to quilt making, A press release from the Quilters Hall of Fame stated the "Quilters Hall of Fame applauds the Lutheran World Relief Quilt and Kit Ministry for their determined endeavors to meet the needs of people affected by poverty and disaster and on July 15-17, 2021 will award them the Crystal Thimble Award for their significant impact in the world of quilt making. LWR Mission Quilts are highly regarded throughout the world because of their quality and consistency. Considering LWR's first quilts in 1945 given to families in war-torn Europe to today's annual average world distribution of 300,000 quilts, it is clear to

Award in 2021. The Crystal Thimble Award is new in 2021 and is to recognize not-for-profit organizations that have had a significant impact in the world of quilting."

This quilting honor not only recognized the countless acts of service from Lutheran women across the world, it also

revealed a very simple but powerful truth. It revealed the power of simple acts of love for the neighbor. When Jesus was asked "Which commandment is the greatest and most important?' he did not hesitate. He said "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, and soul, and

strength, and mind." Then he added, "and the second is just like it, 'love your neighbor as your-self." Loving God is loving our neighbor. Loving our neighbor is loving God.

When Martin Luther talked about how to love God and neighbor, he said that the way to be a good Christian is not to call attention to the fact that you are a Christian. If you are a cobbler (shoe maker) and want to be a

good Christian and serve God, you don't do it by stamping little crosses somewhere on the shoe. You just make the best shoes you can make. Likewise, if you are a baker and want to serve God well, you don't shape the

bread into the form of a cross. You just make good bread at a fair price. This honors God

and serves the neighbor. For decades, so many at Bethel have served God by serving their neighbor by making good quilts and preparing kits. They have done so through several generations, collecting fabric, cutting squares, meeting at church to sew and tie piece after piece. It is slow painstaking work that requires

endurance, commitment, and a heart for God. They have done this, for the most part, out of the public eye. But in the weeks ahead, we will come together as a church in support of this work. Making quilt, making kits to ship all over the world.

rian McLaren joins Bethel on September 7 at 7:00 pm for an evening of not only straight talk about Christianity but also genu-



BETHEL'S UKRAINIAN CIRCLE OF LOVE, A LIFELINE

hen Russia invaded Ukraine, Bethel's Circle of Love Ukrainian Relief ministry moved into high gear to organize support. Through a special fund, Bethel

brought Marina Suhaida to safety from Ukraine to Madison.

Now living with members Craig and Michelle Jolly, she has shared her harrowing escape from the Russian army through the Carpathian Mountains and then Turkey. Bethel's fund for the needy covered

the expense of Marina's application for asylum, enabling her to attend school, get a driver's license, and work legally. Bethel's Circle of Love has also provided direct support to people in Ukraine: \$4,000 to help for Bethel's individual Circle of Love participants living in Borodyanka, Ukraine; \$3,550 for supplies for the children's psy-

chological play therapy program;

\$2,900 for dental supplies,

shipping expenses and traumatic dental services for active military; \$3,000 for Circle of Love Ukrainian immigrants; \$5,000 for the community center for their timely distribution for emergency care. In the

immediate future, we are sending \$2,500 quarterly for children's psychological programming and \$5,000 bi-annually

for emergency relief in addition to helping Bethel's Circle of Love immigrants.



In a recent email, Lyudmila Boyko, the director of the community center in Borodyanka, wrote: We continue to work hard, in full force, even though don't have our own premises we got used to it. We have a small office in one building and another one - a small classroom - in the survived school building where part of our team works. Other staff work outside and make home visits to those in need. The new center is slowly being built.



NEWLY COMPLETED COLUMBARIUM TO BE DEDICATED AUGUST 6

hat began as a dream and idea in 2021 has become a reality at Bethel. On Sunday, August 6, Bethel will hold a dedication during the 9:00 worship service for the recently completed Bethel Columbarium.

The long wait is finally over. After two years of surveys, planning, and construction, Bethel has created a sacred place for the cremated remains of members, former members, friends of Bethel, and their families. The Bethel Columbarium, located in a separate room accessible through the sanctuary contains individual niches or compartments to hold the cremated remains of loved ones. There is also a memorial wall for plaques honoring others interred elsewhere.

The Columbarium is a place to pray, remember, and to give thanks to God for the deceased person's life. The room contains artwork from Bethel's past, stained glass windows and a custom designed cross at its center. The Columbarium may be visited whenever the church is open or people wishing to visit at other times may contact the church office to schedule a special visit.
