

Anna will join us in Good Shepherd Chapel or Fireside via Zoom from Two Harbors, MN. for two Sunday forums - Sept 17 and Oct 1 @ 10:30 and on October 8, she will be with us in person. These forums will draw upon her new book *Joyful Defiance: Death Does Not Win The Day.*

Joyful defiance isn't happy talk or a feeling. It's a way of living planted between the reality of loss and the realer reality of life. Anna calls it "Holy Saturday living". It's a way of living that says 'no' to the power of loss over us and 'yes' to life.

Rev. Dr. Anna Madsen's book, Joyful Defiance: Death Does Not Win The Day

The challenge is to acknowledge the reality of loss without letting it claim us. In Anna's experience, loss must be aired with God and lamented. We are freed to share our pain, anger, grief, and confusion with God just like the Psalmists. Lamenting to God deprives loss from having the last word. It zaps its power running through us like an endless victory lap and invites joy-filled defiance to take its place. She writes, "Joy is the source of hope and resilience despite, and to spite, death...Joy is rooted in God... is a bit like grace."

"...now that we know that death doesn't win, there is more to do with our lives than preserve them. Savoring and spreading delight instead of death may take energy, but it gives it right back by way of individual and communal joy. This joy is not the stuff of platitudes, positive thinking will not bring it about, it is not a panacea, and it cannot be created or sold or bought. Instead it's an essence defined by the knowledge that God has been, is and will be present in

our pain to bring about peace." Anna Madsen, Joyful Defiance: Death Does Not Win the Day.

Rev. Dr. Anna Madsen is a Lutheran pastor and public theologian living outside Two Harbors, Minnesota.

After graduating from Trinity Lutheran Seminary, she served a small South Dakota parish for three years before earning a doctorate in systematic theology in Regensburg, Germany. Immediately prior to her return to teach religion at a college in

the Midwest, an accident killed her husband and severely injured her threeyear-old son Karl. Her daughter Else was eight months old at the time. This event profoundly shaped her theology and her life.

Sitting in the pew at her

husband's funeral, Anna heard the last verse of the great Reformation hymn: "Were they to take our house, goods, honor, child, or spouse, though life be wrenched away, they cannot win the day. The kingdom's ours forever!" Reflecting on this experience, Madsen realized that death takes victory laps when its power appears to be

greater than life. And she defiantly refused to cede death any more wins.






and died for-unconditional love. He is a faculty member of The Living School and podcaster

BETHEL TO PARTNER WITH EMERSON ELEMENTARY

June 6, 2023, a group of interested Bethel members joined a "Lunch and Learn" session with Mary Bartzen, Director of Community Partnerships for the Madison Public Schools Foundation, to learn about the Adopt-a-School partnership program. Five Bethel members, Renee Tennant, Katie Ward, John Shanda, Linda Leonhart, and Kris Fansler, emerged as a leadership team when the people present decided to form a partnership with a Madison Area Elementary School.

On Thursday, August 3, Renee Tennant, John Shanda, and I along with Adopt-a-School coordinator Mary Bartzen, met with the principal of Emerson Elementary, Jessica Awe, to talk about establishing a Bethel-Emerson partnership. Jessica remarked that, "this partnership would be a dream!" Our leadership team has committed to being a partner for at least one year. After Jessica meets with her school leadership team, they will come up with a list of needs and wants, some of which we may be able to fulfill.

Emerson is a 360-student school, 4K through grade 5, located between E Johnson St. and E Washington and between 6th and 7th St. Its student population is diverse both racially and economically. It is supported by its neighborhood and school families.

If you are interested in tutoring, classroom assisting, accompanying field trips, or any volunteer situation in which you may be alone with students, MMSD requires a background check. This is easy and doesn't take more than a few minutes. Please go to the district's website, madison.K12.wi.us/partnerships/volunteering and click on the Volunteering button which will lead you through the steps. Completing a background check does not commit you to volunteering, but the sooner you complete the background check application and it is processed, the sooner you can be one of Bethel's Adopt-a-School Volunteers if and when you choose. Please do this ASAP as our hope is to begin with Emerson in late September/early October.

Thank you for your interest in participating in this way as part of your Christian service to others. In my opinion, our partnership in this project is also proof that the congregation remains strong even in this time of stress and change, as we continue to reach out to others as Jesus would. - Kris Fansler

THE POWER OF THE CIRCLE

ne of the first components of Bethel's Homeless Ministry when initially conceived by Pastor Laura Sutherland and Arlen Christenson, was to provide a faith-based means in which guests could communicate with each other and Bethel volunteers. That became what is known as "The Circle". This has been a part of BHM for greater than 15 years and is still a significant and meaningful part of Tuesday mornings. We gather with our chairs in a circle and begin with a special reading that pertains to homelessness, followed by announcements that may pertain to the members of the group. Then we ask each person to identify themselves by first name and to share with us any part of their week that they would like to talk about. If a guest chooses not to talk with us, he/she can be an "active listener". We end by reciting a special prayer for Ukraine (blue and vellow candles are lit in the center of the circle) and then each member of the Circle is named in prayer, closing with Our Lord's Prayer. The following was composed during Circle in December 2022 by one of our volunteers.

"The Power of the unconditional love of Christ is present in the circle. This morning 40+ members of our community ...

Those who have no shelter or home ...

Those who are without warm clothing or a meal to eat ...

Those who have been incarcerated ...

Those with substance issues ... (both their own or being affected by other's)

Those struggling with a myriad of mental illness and mental health issues ...

Those who have attempted suicide and self-harm ...

Those who have witnessed death, murder, and unspeakable violence ...

Those who are poor and lacking in any mate-

rial possessions, amid great wealth and abundance ...

Those who have bled and suffered without care ...

Those who have accessed medical services only to be dismissed or medicated and forgot-ten ...

Yet ...

Despite these and so many unspoken hardships on which life and death balance on a thread ...

The presence of our loving God ... He knows each one in the circle and welcomes all with warmth, care and loving and open arms ... our God whose love gives and instills hope.

The strength of the Homeless Ministry at Bethel can be found in the hearts and relationships that are formed between strangers who have now shed anonymity to become family ... who feel loved and welcomed.

Our Father tells us and instills in our hearts the Good News ... that He loves us and died to save us from our sins and give us everlasting life ... but our love for Him without works is dead ... He calls us to clothe the naked, to feed the hungry, to shelter our brothers and sisters from the cold, to welcome them ... to bind their wounds ... to show them unconditional love ... to be His face and hands and feet ... but by the Grace of God, there go I. The mission of Bethel's Homeless Ministry is found in the welcoming relationships it forms with hundreds of God's children ... in providing faith, hope, safety and unconditional love."


