met Pat Barry in 2018 when we moved the Bethel Bible Series offices from Waunakee, WI, to Bethel Lutheran Church in downtown Madison, WI. At the time, Pat was the past President of the Bethel Lutheran Church Council. I introduced myself to him after one Sunday service. Pat, at 6'6", was not hard to find among the crowd after the service. I suggested we meet the following week in my new office at Bethel Lutheran, and Pat agreed.

Pat and I hit it off and found that we had much in common. One of the things we had in common that few might have predicted was that we both smoked cigars. As there are only a limited number of places where you can smoke cigars

Most of the talk at the "Cigar Club" was about the state of Christianity today. We meet as a group about once a month, and just Pat and I meet about every two weeks.

Sometime in late-2020, Pat and I came up with the idea of doing a podcast talking about our walk with Christ. We named it, "Walking with God, Pat and Jeff's Podcast." We released our first episode in January 2021 and try to release a new podcast every two weeks.

our podcast has been downloaded a couple thousand times. People who listen to the podcast tell us they enjoy our candid talk about what it means to be a Christian today. They seem to identify with us as a couple of normal guys devoted to the Lord, Jesus Christ.

Our theme for the podcast is based on a quote from C.S. Lewis that has been meaningful to both Pat and me. The quote is from Lewis' God in the Dock (1970), "Christianity, if false, is of no importance, and if true, of infinite importance. The only thing it cannot be is moderately important."

Both Pat and I have seen in our lived experiences that Christianity is indeed true and, therefore, is infinitely important. This is the theme of our podcast. We hope to inspire people to realize that a lukewarm Christianity does not make sense if Jesus is who He says He is, the Son of the Living God.

Pat and I know that He is who He says He is, and He will do what He says He will do.

Our discussions cover a wide range of Christian topics. Some of our recent podcasts have

focused on what it means to walk by faith and not by sight, how each of us can plant seeds to live out the Great Commission, and the "I AM" statements found in the Gospel of John.

I hope that the podcast will attract a wider audience, but whether it does or not, Pat and I are having a wonderful, meaningful time talking every two weeks about our Christian walk and sharing it in the podcast.

YOU'RE INVITED! KIDS & FAMILY MINISTRY PROGRAMS TOUR

February 11th at 10:30am

n August we received a generous grant from the Bethel Endowment Foundation to update Kids & Family space and programming. This grant, in conjunction with some of our existing resources, has allowed us to reorganize and enhance. We've created a separate child care space for school aged kids separate from the Nursery which serves our youngest children. This allows for more developmentally appropriate and safer spaces and activities. The new space, called Kids' Corner, also has room for large motor activities for all ages. This is a wonderful addition for a church without an outdoor play space.

We filled in gaps and added new toys, games, books, supplies and other equipment. We improved the aesthetics of the Nursery/Kids Corner, Sunday School classrooms, hallways, and the choir/large group room with art, lighting and home-like decor to make it warmer and more inviting. We also organized the storage areas and purchased shelving and storage containers to inventory and better utilize the resources we now have. We've added signage and labeling for clarity and organization. Last,

we created a waiting area and a meeting space where families can connect while waiting for their kids' programs to end. Families can have small group playdates for toddlers or meet for parent support groups in a space dedicated to family ministry.

Everyone is invited to come and check it out. The Director of Kids & Family Ministry, Paula, and Nursery Coordinator, Zoey, will be giving a tour on Sunday, February 11th. We will begin in the Nursery on the 1st floor at 10:30am, will venture up to the Sunday School wing including the family spaces and end in Kids Corner. Kids won't be in the spaces when we tour them so you can ask questions and see how everything looks and works better with our updates. We will work around the kids' slightly modified Sunday routine.

We want to thank the Bethel Endowment Foundation for supporting the upgrade to our space and programming! Thanks also to the many volunteers and staff who assisted in this next-level update, we couldn't have done it without you!

Catching Up With The Spirit

ent is almost here.

Lent is the 40-day preparation for Easter. This year we'll look at how the Holy Spirit leads us — individually and as a church — as we walk the way of Jesus to the foot of the cross and on to the hope of Easter.

Our guide for this journey is the book of Acts of the Apostles -- the sequel to the Gospel of Luke. Some have suggested a more appropriate title for Acts is "the Acts of the Spirit" because the book is filled with stories of the Spirit beckoning and nudging and calling the Apostles into new ways of seeing and being. One thing is for certain — the Apostles were forever changed by the presence of the Spirit — and they forever changed the church.

These stories of the early church invite us to open ourselves to the Spirit and where it's beckoning and nudging and calling us today.

Take a few minutes to read about Lent 2024 and consider how you'll join in 40 Days of Spiritual Renewal - Catching Up With the Spirit here at Bethel.

When does Lent start?

Lent starts on February 14, Ash Wednesday, and lasts for 40 days, not counting Sundays, since Sundays are celebrated as feasts of the resurrection. The study groups will begin the week of February 19 (Monday) and run for a total of five weeks, ending the week before Holy Week.

What about Ash Wednesday worship?

Bethel will have two Ash Wednesday worship opportunities on February 14, a traditional Ash Wednesday service from 12:30-1:30 pm and a traditional Ash Wednesday service led by Bethel Youth from 6:00-6:30 pm. Imposition of ashes will be offered at both services. The nursery will be open for the evening service, families must pre-register.

What is Bethel doing for Lent this year?

The Lent journey is marked by a daily and weekly rhythm – daily devotion and prayer and weekly worship and Bible study. At Bethel we call it 2+2+1 – two daily practices plus two weekly plus one service project.

Almost 40 Bethel members and friends have contributed a daily devotion and prayer that will be emailed daily and available in a digital pdf document for download. There will not be a printed devotional booklet.

Our weekly Bible study uses the book Acts: Catching Up With the Spirit by Matthew Skinner. There will be large and small group discussion opportunities based on the book.

Individuals, families and small groups are encouraged to find a service project that fits their schedules and interests. Maybe it's shoveling snow for an elderly neighbor or donating blood. Maybe it's tying quilts for Blanket Workshop or making kits for Lutheran World Relief. Maybe the time is right to start tutoring at your local elementary school or helping to serve a monthly meal at Luke House.

We will also collect a weekly "drop in the barrel" for Bethel's Food Pantry during Lent. The items for the barrel are:

Week 1: Shampoo

Week 2: Dish Soap

Week 3: Toothpaste

Week 4: Deodorant

Week 5: Baby Wipes

Week 6: Hand Sanitizer (in small containers)

How can I participate in the Lent study and what is the schedule?

Small Group: For existing or new small groups

Encourage your existing small group (like a women's circle) to participate OR form a small group just for this 5-week study. A member of the group will need to serve as the discussion leader. We will provide the leader with a leader guide, videos, training and support. Email adulted@bethel-madison.org to sign up your small group and discussion leader.

Asynchronously: For individuals

We'll use the app "Marco Polo" to facilitate an online asynchronous group discussion. Email adulted@bethel-madison.org for more information.

Do I need a copy of Acts: Catching Up With the Spirit by Matthew Skinner and how can I get one?

Acts: Catching Up With the Spirit is the basis for our study of the book of Acts and access to a copy is strongly recommended. We'll read and study a chapter a week of the Skinner book.

The daily devotions will be distributed digitally.

LOVED BY MANY

When I was in 10th grade, my English teacher asked us to write an essay based on three words-"It is cold".

I got busy writing as I thought I knew what it member meant to be cold, living in northern Wisconsin and having to walk just over a mile from school to home each school day. Apparently, I convinced my teacher what it meant to be cold having received an A on the essay. I believe that it takes having a lived experience before one can authentically depict it.

HOPE Last Sunday at Bethel, two unhoused men were talking IOVE about how difficult it is to be cold. They were sleeping outside at night with blankets that were at first damp and then frozen. They were cold walking from one destination to another. Their fingertips were cold and discolored, their faces felt frozen, and their feet felt like chunks of ice as they walked. They could not afford to warm up in a restaurant or coffee shop because they could not afford to purchase a beverage or food item (restaurants do not allow people to warm up unless they are able to purchase something). They knew what it meant to be cold. This state of being cold was wearing

on them to the point where one of them felt suicidal and even had a plan. This gentleman was fortunate enough to talk to two members of Bethel's congregation who alerted another member and thus began a series of encounters that led to a change of heart and a change in his plans. This person was loved by eight people ... two who first listened to his plight, another person discerned the seriousness of his problems,

the next who stopped and gave a huge

hug, another who again offered to listen and sympathize, three others who sat with this gentleman and his friend and shared coffee while problem solving, and another who offered to take their blankets home to wash and dry them. Each person who encountered these men

demonstrated God's love for others. Each person offered what he/she could as a gift from God and was able to help the men solve some of their problems and make different plans for their futures. The men left Bethel more uplifted and hopeful, knowing that others cared about them and that they were not alone to deal with their problems. This was an example of the meaningful words "God's work. Our hands." written on the many golden Bethel T-shirts! \$\infty\$

RUTH'S STORY

n their 3rd or 4th date, Pastor Duane took Ruth to Bethel Horizons for the first time. It was 1971 and the very first summer that Bethel Horizons welcomed campers. "Camp was so primitive back then. The kids slept in teepees or on a tarp under the stars, and the staff consisted of 2-3 counselors, a cook, a bus driver, and a few in-camp staff." Ruth shared.

Ruth recalls times when the water would dry up, and the staff would pile onto the bus on Saturdays for their weekly showers at the Governor Dodge State Park shower house. "We'd have enough water to eat and do the dishes for the week. The bathroom was a pit toilet." Ruth said with a smile.

Through faith, vision, and determination, Horizons would grow in its mission of connecting those who visit, to the harmonies of God, self, others, and nature.

"Duane was the ultimate salesman and good at pulling things together," Ruth said. "If he didn't know something, he'd find the right person with particular talents to help Horizons grow and expand its programming. He brought in nurses and social workers to teach the counselors how to successfully and compassionately handle behavioral issues they may encounter with campers. He would find builders, masons, and woodworkers if a building needed to be built or repaired. He had a passion for experiential

learning and recruited gardeners, naturalists, and musicians to expand the programming at camp. This led to the ropes course focusing on team building and corporate games." Ruth said.

Ruth looks back at those early days and says she is most thankful that Horizons is "maintaining its mission to reach a diverse group of people young and old. The basic harmonies are still thought about, programmed, and experienced. Duane would be so excited about the diversity of programming." Ruth continued, "It's wonderful that so many more people are being drawn to Horizons. The trails are opening up the land while still protecting it. It's not being hurt but enjoyed. The arts program at Adamah has gone in a direction that Duane and Don Hunt could have only dreamed of. Duane would be so proud of the work and growth at Horizons."

"Horizons is what it is today because of so many people investing something of themselves," Ruth said.

As we begin the 55th year at Bethel Horizons, we are so grateful to this incredible community of support who have given so much of their time, talent, and treasure to ensure that Horizons continues to inspire and impact the next generation of campers and visitors.
