WELCOME PASTOR LAUREN WRIGHTSMAN

n April 1, Pastor Lauren Wrightsman joins Bethel as our Transition Lead Pastor, a first step on the path to a permanent call. There will be many occasions for the congregation to welcome and talk with Pastor Lauren in the coming months. Members of the Call Committee had the opportunity to talk with Pastor Lauren shortly before she arrived at Bethel.

We're going from a typical call process where only five people would know who you were before calling you as a pastor to one where the entire congregation is getting to know you. What excites you about that?

This might be the longest interview process I've ever gone through. The call process here is not only new for me, but for Bethel as well. I haven't done anything like this in my 25

years of ministry and see it as a real gift. Usually a Call Committee's work is complete when the new pastor arrives, who is then on their own. This process offers a wonderful shared opportunity to walk alongside the entire congregation and get to know one another in a more holistic way. It's really a gift and offers time for some great conversation centered around where the Holy Spirit is leading Bethel Lutheran next.



We've been studying the book of Acts during Lent and how the Spirit has led the church since the beginning - often in unexpected ways that can't be explained otherwise. Where do you see the Spirit at work here with you and [husband] Dave coming to Bethel? That's a great question. And I can honestly say it's only because of the work of the Spirit that this process was able to move forward. I first heard about Bethel's transition in July and later, when the Synod asked "Have you ever thought about doing an interim?" I said "No." As a settled pastor, interim ministry seemed too risky for a move of this sort. So, I kept on saying "no." However, as soon as I stepped out of the way and began to trust in the work of the Spirit, everything fell into place. It was not an easy decision to make because I love Roseville Lutheran and the ministry I have been a part of there. Dave and I spent a lot of time in prayer and conversation, but as soon as I released all the roadblocks I had put in place to saying "yes" - everything naturally fell into place. It wasn't a forced decision but a natural one - a totally Spirit-led decision. Bethel Lutheran is also blessed with some excellent lay leaders who trusted that Spiritled work. The interim work that you've done as a congregation is impressive. Talk about the work of the Spirit. Talk about acts of the apostles.

Clergy couples aren't unusual but have you and Dave ever been pastors at the same church? [Pastor Dave Wrightsman will join Bethel as an Associate Transition Pastor around July 1.]

When I was on maternity leave with our youngest, Dave was doing an interim at St. Andrews Lutheran teaching the Bethel Series and leading new member classes. When I came back to St. Andrews from maternity leave into my role as an associate pastor, we were together for six months. I don't honestly remember being in his office. I was in a different building doing different ministry.

For us as a couple, as we considered this call, sharing our gifts at the same church was of course one of our conversations. "Can we do

this? What will this look like?" Now that we're empty nesters, it seemed like a great opportunity for us to use our passion and love for the ministry and start paddling together in the same boat and in the same direction. We are pretty excited about the opportunity to do this

together as we have such varying gifts.

You're packing up a house in Stillwater and moving into a two-bedroom apartment in Madison. What's that process like?

I haven't lived in an apartment since I was 27. I've been asking questions of my young adult children like, "When do I sign up for the gas and electric?" As far as living in an apartment, I'm pretty adaptable. I spent two years living abroad - first in Billund, Denmark, and then Nottingham, England, so I'm used to living sparsely and in different places. I'm bringing a few special things to make it feel a bit more homey. Living in an apartment is giving

me time to get to know the Madison area and I see it as a gift that I'm not trying to sell a house right now. Our dog Andy and cat Tipsy are coming along with the move. On my first Sunday (April 7) Dave and our daughter Adelee (sophomore at Luther College) will be joining me. Dave will start his ministry at Bethel in

You're going to be meeting a lot of people. What can we do to make that go smoothly?

Name Tag Sunday needs to be every Sunday for the next six months.

Have you been to Bethel or Bethel Horizons before?

I've not been to Bethel Horizons and I'm excited to go out there on April 6 for Spring at Horizons. Dave and I were at Bethel in 2009 for the Bethel Series training and stayed at the Edgewater while my parents (Bethel members, Carolyn and Roger Eigenfeld) took care of our children at their house in Madison. I remember Bill White led a few of those sessions. I've been downtown a few times when we were here to visit my parents, most recently at Thanksgiving when we had an interview with the Executive Committee and a "speed tour" of the building with Denis Vogel.

What are you curious about Bethel?

I'm curious to see how the Spirit is alive and active and what that means as we move into ministry and the future together. What excites me most is getting into a new community of faith to experience where God is leading. I'm curious to see the impacts the members of the church have on each other as well as the greater Madison area. The walls between a church and the community are much more fluid than ever before. A church is a place to be fed and nurtured so you can go out into the community. When you think about the breath of the Spirit, it's inhale/exhale. We must inhale together, to be fed, and then exhale by living out your faith wherever you work or live. You can't just do one, and it is sometimes hard work to get into that rhythm. I'm curious how Bethel can listen more keenly to conversations that are happening in the community. The relationship with the Synod is essential and is an example of the inhale/exhale. We inhale the resources that God has available to us, and exhale by using those gifts with one another.

What are you looking forward to most about coming to Bethel and to Madison?

I'm looking forward to being part of another community of faith. The apostle Paul didn't stay in one place and there's something to be learned from that. In each community, Paul recognized the gifts present and I'm excited to see how the Spirit is working in and through the gifts of the Bethel community. The move to the Madison area and Bethel Lutheran seems very natural at this point in my life. I am blessed that my parents live here and are members of

Bethel, and my sister and her family live west of Madison

What do you expect to be your first order of business at Bethel?

The first order of business is building relationships -- sitting down to understand people's experiences and what their hopes are. Hearing people's stories is so important to me. We're all on this path of humanity together and all of us are experiencing it in different ways. Stories help us understand the background of who we are and can help us to better understand the shared story of the church. Culture and story have always been important to me. When I was a 17-year-old exchange student in Denmark, I grew to understand that we are all part of God's wonderful creation, living together through our differences, but enriched by shared experiences that cross cultural barriers. My experience in Denmark led me to major in Anthropology and Linguistics at Luther College in Decorah, IA. Stories offer a glimpse of our "cultural DNA" and help us discover the unique characteristics that we share as individuals, and as a congregation.

Since you're an avid reader, what is a recent book you've read and what is special about it?

The most recent book that comes to mind is The Covenant of Water by Abraham Verghese. It tells the story of three generations of a family, of love and steadfastness - and there is this beautiful faith element dripping underneath it. My mother and I often share book recommendations with one another and as she read it, I was frequently calling her up to see where she was in the story.

The Road, by Cormac McCarthy is one of my favorite books. It is a story of a father and his son living in a dystopian future. I think I have read it 20 times, and with each read I find another example of love and humanity in times of grief and distress. I also like non-fiction writers like Anne Lamott. I appreciate Lamott's humorous take on the human condition and the need to be dipped in grace all the time. Barbara

Brown Taylor – she's another writer I like to read

What do you want us to know about you?

I love to laugh. I do. I love to have fun doing ministry. It should be fun and joyous work to trust all of the God-given gifts that we have been given, and then use those gifts collaboratively in the shared work we are called to be a part of.

You've identified your favorite Bible verse as one from Romans: "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!" What makes this so special to you?

"How beautiful are the feet..." what a beautiful way to bless us as we go about this work of sharing and living the Gospel message. It captures, for me, the essence of what it means to be a Christian in the world.



Joe Mueller is an active, adventurous senior at Memorial High School who has always enjoyed being outdoors. Taking Advanced Ropes at Memorial High School was a no-brainer for him.

"I was really excited about this class because of all the cool stuff we get to do outdoors and to be able to have access to climbing is something I was really interested in learning more about," Joe shared. "One thing I really appreciated about our field trip to Horizons was the group of people that we went with, and the venue was just super unique. Our trip to Horizons was very different from what my day-to-day life is like. I really enjoyed it when we spent time meditating and reflecting on the cliffs. It was great to get out of the normal things I typically do. It's something I am going to continue to prioritize in my life as it was very relaxing and enjoyable."

"When you do a field trip like this, you are forced to work with other people, and you need other people. This is a skill that comes naturally on the ropes course. You learn to rely on and trust each other," shared Joe. "For any school looking to do a field trip to Bethel Horizons, it really will help your students build better relationships with each other."

I was thankful to spend some time with Joe and his class during their visit to Horizons. I was extremely impressed with how they articulated their experiences, shared stories of the friendships that have developed, and how being a part of an Adventure Challenge class has helped them grow as individuals by taking risks and overcoming challenges that made them uncomfortable.

HOMELESS MINISTRY MEAL ASSISTANCE

2023 was a very busy year at Bethel's Homeless Ministry. At the beginning of the year we were serving about 60 guests each day that the ministry was open. By the end of the year that number had increased to 90 guests per day. One of the important aspects of the program is the delicious and nutritious hot meals that we are able to provide each Tuesday and Thursday noon. During 2023 we were very fortunate to have most of the Thursday meals provided for free by a wonderful donor. She made the meals in her house and delivered them to Bethel. Unfortunately, she is not able

to continue to provide meals this year. As you may expect, that has left us with a significant budget problem. We are looking for individuals or groups who would like to sponsor meals or prepare meals. EMERSON ELEMENTARY

Thank you to everyone who participated in one of Bethel's Lenten service projects, a work morning at Emerson Elementary, Bethel's Adopt-a-School partner. Thirteen Bethel members met Saturday, March 2, at Emerson to complete several projects.

One group sanitized furniture and surfaces in kindergarden classrooms. Another cleared out a small storeroom to create a small tutoring space. Math and reading materials were organized and consolidated. The book storage room was neatened, items reshelved, and workspace created. This was a good morning's work, and much appreciated by principal Jessica Awe.

Bethel's final church-wide drive for this school year for Emerson Elementary, is a call for underwear, girls' leggings, and boys' sweatpants. They are desperate for size 5-6 leggings for girls, and sizes 5-6, and 7-8 sweatpants for boys. Also needed is underwear in girls' sizes 6-8, 10-12, and 14-16, and boys' sizes 10-12 and 14-16. Young children have accidents and most children fall in puddles occasionally. New or gently used items are welcome.

If you're out shopping for spring clothes for your kids or grandkids, please consider adding something for the kids at Emerson. We will have a table for collection April 7 and 14 in the Emmaus Room. However, you may turn in items before then at the reception desk either on weekdays or on Sundays. Since the need is urgent, we will make deliveries each week between now and April 15. Thank you for supporting these children in our neighborhood.

There are many ways to support the Adopt-a-School project. Many members have donated boots or other clothing items. Others brought food for the teachers' breakfast during their professional development day in February. Some folks have given money; others donate their time as tutors or art class volunteers.
